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## Keynote Speakers



Carolyn Denard is Associate Provost for Student Success and Professor of English at Georgia College and State University, where she has oversight of seven units devoted to student success inside and outside of the classroom: The Academic Advising Center, the Writing Center, the Learning Center, the Testing Center, the First-Year Bridge Scholars Program, the Honors Programs, and the Leadership Programs. As Director of the Center for Student Success, her goals are to make sure that all students progress successfully to graduation in four years and that they take advantage of the high impact practices that can enhance their educational experience overall.

Dr. Denard's first-hand understanding of student performance inside the classroom and the ways in which college resources and faculty expectations can impact the level of that performance inform her knowledge of successful student development. She says as a teacher, her greatest joy has always been moving her students from point A to point B—helping them to have that “aha” moment when they finally get the lesson being taught and can move forward and use that knowledge independently. Through in-service teaching workshops and departmental and professional conference presentations, she has shared with faculty ways to shape their pedagogy to help students become confident and independent learners.

Dr. Denard received her B.A. in English from Jackson State University; her M.A.T. in English from Indiana University, and her PhD in American Studies from Emory University. She has served as a Faculty Fellow at the Georgia Board of Regents, a Women's Studies Fellow at Emory University, and has been a recipient of Anne Harris Fellowship from the American Association of University Women and the W.E.B. Du Bois Center at Harvard University. Her work in private colleges and state universities has given her a broad view of student success and the tools that professionals in developmental education can use to help all students succeed.

Alex Madva is an assistant professor of philosophy at California State Polytechnic University, Pomona (Cal Poly Pomona). His research centers on the questions that developments in social psychology raise for philosophy of mind, philosophy of race and feminism, and applied ethics, especially prejudice and discrimination. Alex has written or co-written articles on these topics for journals including *Noûs*, *Ethics*, *Pacific Philosophical Quarterly*, *Ergo*, *Synthese*, and *Mind and Language*. He is currently co-editing two book

volumes, *An Introduction to Implicit Bias: Knowledge, Justice, and the Social Mind* and *Philosophers on the Movement for Black Lives*.

Alex is also actively engaged in collaborative empirical research. One ongoing project explores the underlying psychological structure of stereotypes while another is testing interventions to reduce achievement gaps and increase belonging for members of underrepresented groups at Cal Poly Pomona, in disciplines such as physics, economics, mathematics, biology, and philosophy. His published and forthcoming research on these topics has appeared in journals including *Ratio* and the *International Journal of STEM Education*.

Alex received his BA in Philosophy and English at Tufts University and his MA and PhD from Columbia University. Alex has taught courses including *Race and Racism in Western Thought*, *Cognitive Science*, *Feminist Philosophy of Science*, *Social and Political Philosophy*, *Contemporary Moral Problems*, and upper-division undergraduate and graduate seminars on implicit bias, social psychology, and philosophy. He has led numerous workshops, keynote and plenary addresses, and training sessions on intergroup bias, stereotype threat, and impostor syndrome for schools, courts, and wider audiences.

### *Improving Academic Advisement through Predictive Analytics and Proactive Interventions*

Georgia State University is proud to host NADE's study tour at our University Advisement Center (UAC). In 2012, GSU began the use of predictive analytics to track all students. Since then, their four-year graduation rates have improved by six percentage points. Students are also graduating more quickly. They are graduating 1,700 more students every year than they were five years ago, and the biggest gains have been enjoyed by low-income students, black students and Hispanic students. They have eliminated achievement gaps. Last year, they became the only national university at which black, Hispanic, first-generation, and low-income students graduated at rates at or above the rate of the student body overall. The presentation, tour, and demonstrations will take place at 25 Park Place in Suite 400.

## Transportation Information

### from Hartsfield Jackson Airport to Atlanta Marriott Marquis

- **MARTA** – Atlanta's rapid rail system MARTA is the easiest, fastest and most cost-effective way to travel between the Atlanta airport and the Marriott Marquis hotel. The airport MARTA station is located in the ground transportation area, near baggage claim. No cash or tokens are accepted at the MARTA turnstiles. Your "ticket" is a Breeze Card - an electronic card that you purchase from a vending machine or MARTA ticket kiosk. Load cash value onto the card at time of purchase for anticipated trips. The one-way fare is \$2.50. Round trip: \$5.00. Tap your Breeze card at the turnstile to enter the station. The train platform is at the top of the escalators. Both trains that depart from the airport (the Gold line to Doraville, and the Red line to North Springs) travel north through downtown, and reach your destination – Peachtree Center Station – in 17 minutes. Trains run every 10 minutes on weekdays and every 20 minutes on weekends. Once at the station, exit into the Peachtree Center mall, where there's a sky bridge connection to the hotel. Turn left after Caribou Coffee and right at the ATM. Follow signs to the Marriott.

- **Taxi** – Estimated taxi fare to hotel is \$32 one way.
- **Uber and Lyft** are available.

**From the airport** -- Travel north on Interstate 75/85 to exit 248C for Andrew Young International Boulevard. Turn left onto the boulevard then right onto Peachtree Center Avenue. The hotel is two blocks on the right.

**North to South** – Take I-75/85 South to exit 249A for Courtland Street. Use left two lanes to merge onto Courtland Street NE. Proceed to the third traffic light and turn right onto Andrew Young International Boulevard. Continue one block and turn right onto Peachtree Center Avenue. The hotel is two blocks on the right.

**South to North** – Take I-75/85 North to exit 248C for Andrew Young International Boulevard. Turn left onto the boulevard then right onto Peachtree Center Avenue. The hotel is two blocks on the right.

**East to West** – Take I-20 West to I-75/85 North. Take I-75/85 North to exit 248C for Andrew Young International Boulevard. Turn left onto the boulevard then right onto Peachtree Center Avenue. The hotel is two blocks on the right.
